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The IGC Award

is run on a voluntary basis, with minimum central administration and bureaucracy. All participating centres share a vision for developing better global citizens. They contribute to decision-making and shaping the Award's development.

Piloted in 2007-8, over 140 participants received the first bronze awards in 2008. Now fully operating, over 1600 awards have been made. The first silver awards were made in 2009, and the first gold awards in 2013.

The IGC Award

encourages young people to become better global citizens by

- finding out about other cultures and outlooks
- finding out more about how their everyday lives affect the environment and the lives of others
- taking small actions to help make the world a better place,
- reflecting on their developing knowledge and awareness

The award recognises development and action by individual participants over a period of time – not reaching a fixed "standard".

The programme is operated and run by local centres in different countries, following the same international model, and sharing ideas and practice.

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The IGC Award

- is for individual participants, aged 11-18
- encourages participants to be engaged as active global citizens
 now
- focuses on those aspects of global citizenship that relate to the everyday lives of young people
- is voluntary and non-competitive
- encourages all students to participate
- is awarded by individual local centres, but using a common international model
- involves students fully in its operations
- engages participating centres in sharing ideas and practice and interacting with other centres
- is dynamic and embodies principles of global citizenship
- provides a systematic framework in which existing activities can be incorporated and recognised
- promotes a centre's own developing understanding of global citizenship and global issues
- could simply not have happened before the development of simple and quick global communications.

Elements of the

International GLOBAL CITIZEN'S AWARD

The award programme involves a commitment to action and development in four areas over at least six months:

Understanding other cultures and outlooks

- Reading books / newspapers
- Watching TV and films
- Internet research
- Face-to-face encounters / conversations

Personal Global Footprint

- Being good with money
- Environmental responsibility

Research and action

Working with others

- Personal community service
- Advocacy, persuasion and promotion
- Active participation in decision-making

Recording and reflecting on change and development

A diary / blog to record

- Research
- Views and perspectives
- Actions
- Reflections

Students begin at Bronze level, and can then proceed to Silver and Gold levels.

Silver and Gold award programmes also include a project and mentoring of other participants.
